“A Moment with the Minister”



Our congregational theme for the month of March is humility. You won't find this virtue on any list of most frequented UU sermon themes. We rightly spend a lot of time praising the inherent righteousness in all of us. We spend less time talking about the importance of being humble. But I think it is impossible to be true to Unitarian Universalist principles without working on humility.

Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, “In my walks, every man I meet is my superior in some way, and in that I learn from him.” Truly, the Transcendentalists weren't known for their meekness. Emerson was convinced that every person had inherent spiritual access to God that made listening to preaching, for example, unnecessary. He said so in a sermon. But it was probably this idea that led Emerson to say what he said about learning from every person he met. If the divine is to be found inherently in me, it is also found inherently in you, and if I am curious about your experience, I stand to learn something from you.

We Unitarian Universalists believe passionately that religion ought to be centered on a free search for truth and meaning. But it's a little hard to learn anything when I am always making sure you have gleaned the wisdom I believe is oozing from my every statement. Humility, knowing we always have something more to learn, makes it possible to take in new truths.

Humility doesn't mean having a low opinion of oneself. We ought to know and celebrate our strengths. It does mean having an accurate self-image. None of us knows everything. We can learn from anyone.

One Sunday morning in a congregation I was serving some years ago, a trustee approached me and told me the toilet was broken. “Uh-oh,” I said. I think she was hoping for something more from me, but I didn't know how to fix it. Luckily for us, there was a plumber in the congregation. I learned from him that morning how to fix a toilet. That's a lot more practical than anything he learned from my sermon.

The ancient Stoic Epictetus said it this way: “Know first who you are and what you're capable of. Just as nothing great is created instantly, the same goes for the perfecting of our talents and aptitudes. We are always learning, always growing... Don't kid yourself: If you try to be something or someone you are not, you belittle your true self and end up not developing in those areas that you would have excelled at quite naturally... We each have our own special calling. Listen to yours and follow it faithfully.”

STREET REQUIEM: The Valley UU Adult Choir is performing this wonderful piece along with the choir from the UU Congregation of Phoenix for our annual All-Music Services during Sunday morning worship on March 18 (at UUCP) and March 25 (here at Valley UU). In addition, we will be performing it at a Community Concert on Sunday April 8th at 3 PM at Tempe First United Methodist, 215 E. University Drive in Tempe.

Street Requiem was first premiered in Australia in 2014 and was also recently performed in San Jose, CA, in Texas, and at Carnegie Hall. It was written to honor people who live and die on the streets and to bring issues of homelessness and street violence to public attention. It is set in 10 movements, uses Latin text from the traditional Catholic mass along with contemporary street language, and includes varied musical styles from South African to Celtic to classical. The composers highly encourage choirs who perform this piece to make some connection to homeless issues and include people who live on the streets in the performance.

Since many different faith communities participate in the I-HELP program, serving people who are homeless in Tempe and Chandler, this piece is a great fit for an Interfaith or Community Choir. We have invited singers from various congregations in the Tempe Interfaith Fellowship to rehearse and perform with us in the April concert. We have also reached out to both I-HELP and the Urban Outreach/Shower Program to invite their folks to be a part of this Community Choir. We will be taking a Love Offering at the April 8th concert to help cover concert expenses and contribute to I-HELP and the Urban Outreach/Shower Program. The concert is open to the public, so if you miss hearing *Street Requiem* at VUU on March 25th, or just want to hear it again, please plan to attend the **3 PM concert on April 8.**

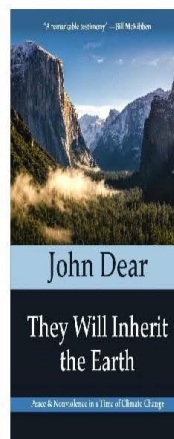


JOIN US FOR AN EVENING WITH JOHN DEAR

SPEND AN EVENING WITH JOHN DEAR ON HIS NEW BOOK:

They Will Inherit the Earth: Peace & Nonviolence in a Time of Climate Change

Join us for an evening reading, reflection and book-signing with longtime activist, priest, author and Nobel peace prize nominee John Dear about his new book, "They Will Inherit the Earth," a landmark work which connects the way of active nonviolence with solidarity with Creation; shows how our global epidemic of violence and war could only lead to catastrophic climate change; and why we need to help build up the global grassroots movement of nonviolence if we are to protect creation. He cites Jesus' third Beatitude as the basis for his meditation: "Blessed are the meek, they will inherit the earth." Thomas Merton said "meekness" was the biblical word for "nonviolence" (in the Gandhi/King sense), so Dear notes how Jesus connected nonviolence with oneness with creation, how he practiced nonviolence and lived at one with creation, and how we need to do the same. John Dear will invite us to rise to the occasion, deepen our nonviolence, take new steps into active solidarity with Mother Earth and suffering humanity, and do what we can to welcome a new culture of peace and nonviolence.



Rev.
