Reverend Dr. Andy's New Monthly Series Interview with a Member of the Congregation



Debbie Dinyes has been a member of VUU since the mid-1970s, when she moved to Tempe at the end of a big adventure. In 1969, Bill and Debbie, both teachers, were living in Dayton, Ohio. The couple spotted an ad in a teaching magazine. Teaching couples were needed in Alaska. With teaching degrees and no children of their own yet, Debbie and Gary decided to go.

The Alaskan bush, Debbie said, "was a total culture shock to me after growing up in the New York City metro area." The first thing she noticed was that there were no bushes in the bush. "It was just flat tundra and little sticks here and there," she said. This would be her home for the next four years.

The first of three schools at which Debbie and Bill taught was Nunivak Island located off the coast of. The village of about 350 people was home to a musk ox sanctuary and a herd of reindeer that the villagers used for meat themselves and for sale. Boardwalks connected the few buildings in the village, since the ground was always either frozen or muddy.

Debbie and Bill lived in the housing set aside for the approximately six teachers at the school. "We were the only people who had electricity throughout the house" Debbie said. "Everyone else had small generators. On Saturday morning, laundry day, the generators got going. We could look right out our door and see the ocean."

There were no roads to speak of in the village, since people traveled mostly by snowmobile and airplane. It wasn't an easy life for the people who called this part of Alaska home, especially prior to the discovery of oil in the state. Since these remote schools were so expensive to operate the Bureau of Indian Affairs ran them. Village schools were K-8 and for high school the students went to school in Anchorage while boarding with families, or to Mont Edgecumbe boarding school in Oregon. Today, due in large part to oil money, these schools are under local control and the schools are all K-12.

The school served as much more than a place to learn science and math. "The school was the best place in town to spend your day." Debbie said. "It had heat and light. It had indoor running water. We never ever had an attendance problem unless somebody was very sick."

When in 1973 they had their first child, Debbie and Bill moved back to the lower 48, to Tempe. Bill worked as a teacher on the Gila River Reservation while Debbie stayed home with the baby, but she was soon ready for adult company. She turned to the yellow pages to find a Unitarian Universalist congregation and found VUU, then located on River Road in Tempe.

Back then, there were fewer than 100 members in the congregation. The VUU sanctuary was a remodeled home with little space for offices or classrooms. Two ministers came and went until the congregation decided to go without a minister for financial reasons.

In those days, like many UU congregations, VUU had no summer services. Instead, there were hikes and swimming pool parties.

"You know we were small, because we all fit in one house," Debbie said. Members wanted to grow, but knew they faced an uphill struggle.

"We decided we're never going to grow here stuck back in that neighborhood," Debbie said. "That was before you had the Internet, so you had the yellow pages to work with. The building was way too small, and we thought we needed something classier."

Some members scraped together money and bought a property on Warner Road. They donated it to the congregation, and a sanctuary was built at 1700 West Warner Road. Still today, a massive chalice reminds passers-by that the building used to host a UU congregation.

The Warner Road sanctuary was built on less than a shoestring budget. "That we could build that building still amazes me because we had a little over 100 members at the time," Debbie said. "I was on the committee representing (religious education), and we talked about what we needed in the kitchen, what we need for the children."

The kitchen was evidence of the squeaky-tight finances for the construction project. "We designed a kitchen with no drawers, because drawers were too expensive. Talk about a shoestring operation. We started to grow because we were a little more noticeable."

Debbie has done just about everything a person can do in a congregation. She taught children at VUU for years, even after she took a job teaching in the Kyrene school district in 1983. She worked alongside other members on pro-choice and peace issues in the 70s and 80s. She served as board president and was an integral part of the 2004 move from Warner Road to our current location in Chandler. Until recently, Debbie headed up the facilities team and worked on stewardship campaigns. She still sings in the choir and helps with the congregation's memorial garden.

She is optimistic about the future of VUU.

"This church has always had a core of people who are interested in keeping the church going," she said. "They had no axes to grind, they just wanted to work for the good of the congregation. We still have them, and I'm sure we will have more people join them."

"I think we have a lot of new, very exciting members, and they're stepping up in various areas and they seem to be sticking around," Debbie said. "I hope they're making friends."

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear friends of VUU,

We had an excellent turnout at our VUU Annual Meeting on June 2^{nd,} and I would like to thank everyone who attended. In that meeting the congregation approved the budget for the upcoming year, elected our new board members, reviewed where we are with our Capital Campaign and had questions answered on building our Faith Oasis. I would like to personally welcome Joan Bundy, Debi Grande, Linda Stenholm and Sue Keen (who graciously agreed to fill out the year term for Paul Schneider) to the Board of Trustees. Returning we have Bob Fabre and DeeAnne McClenahan. In our July Board Meeting, we elected the following officers for the new year's board:

- President Musette Steger
- Vice President Robert Fabre
- Treasurer/Financial Analyst DeeAnne McClenahan
- Secretary Debi Grande
- Board rep to Finance: Bob Fabre
- In addition, Sue Keen, Joan Bundy, and Linda Stenholm took Liaison and/or committee leadership roles

The board also voted in favor of transferring \$16,341 to the Cash Reserves account which will now hold \$60,726 in reserve for potential unknowns and emergencies. As this fund was as low as \$668 for nine months just three years ago, we are pleased to have followed through on our commitment to add not just the \$30,000 we planned over three years, but much more to get us to this record reserves amount that gives VUU more financial stability and credibility as we continue to execute our mission.

Other highlights of the year included increased community outreach, continued new membership, a growing endowment fund, and two newly formed committees CPC (Capitol Planning Committee) and CCC (Capitol Campaign Committee) which are helping us remain mindful of how an improved and more beautiful space can make a powerful difference in our ability to pursue our own spiritual paths and to share VUU's message of love, service, and justice with a wider, more diverse audience. The year ended in a very positive way thanks to the volunteers, staff, and ministers. I would like to especially thank the outgoing board members: Karl Hurst-Wicker, Maria Dixon, Mary Erickson and Paul Schneider. Your work this past year has been vital to get us to this point in our growing and expanding community. And to our outgoing President DeeAnne, a final thanks for your past year as president, for your leadership, role modeling, and vision.

Looking forward, this year's Board will be focusing on getting the new members up to speed and planning our goals during the Board retreat in August. We will also continue spending time on longrange planning with our capital campaign's effort of turning our vision into a bright collective future. As the uncertainty in the wider community continues to expand, I am looking forward to making a positive impact working with Rev. Dr. Andy and the board this year. I am excited for what it will bring.


An opportunity to learn from the Dalai Lama and other modern Buddhist teachers is offered each Sunday. The program is offered in 2 parts:



Immigrant Hosting: What Did We Do? What Happened? What's Next?

VUU's Immigration Team says *Thank You!* and *You Are Amazing!* to the 100+ volunteers who stepped up to host migrant and refugee guests in the VUU sanctuary in May and June. You made it possible for our 87 guests to comfortably pause in their long journeys from home countries to sponsors across the country. You provided food and clothing, diapers and toys, showers and toiletries, traveling snacks, car seats, and transportation to the bus station and airport. Most important of all, your smiles and conversation and one-to-one warm human contact said, "You are welcome here. We are glad to assist you along your way."

For their safety and ours, we never post pictures of our guests, but some takeaways include: "She called from her sister's home in Oakland! She made it there safely!" "She kept asking for a toothbrush, just a toothbrush. You should have seen her face light up when I was able to give her one." "I'm still wearing the friendship bracelet she made while we were chatting at the craft table." "People were SO grateful to finally be able to take a shower and change into clean clothes." "He got off the phone and broke into tears. He had not talked to his brother in more than a year."

Why did we not host in July—and probably won't in August? There has been a significant drop in the number of travelers being dropped off in Phoenix. This is often the case in the hot summer months and is probably also a result of new / fluctuating administration policies being established (and being challenged in court).

Based on the strong show of support from the VUU Congregation, we are confident we can mobilize quickly should the need arise again.



In addition, The International Rescue Committee (IRC), with the support of many Valley organizations including VUU, has just opened a new Welcome Center that will ease the need for hosting at area churches. The Center will eventually have the capacity to help 250+ migrants as they travel from detention through Phoenix to their ICE approved sponsors around the U.S. Most are here for no longer than three days—and center has ample room for beds,


dining, childcare, and all the support needed to arrange bus and air transportation and to provide social and legal services. VUU has donated our shower trailer to the Welcome Center (IRC could not get a certificate of occupancy without it), and several people on our Immigration Team have helped get the center ready to open. 

Our congregational vision for the Capital Campaign is to raise funds for capital improvements to support four main goals:

- Family friendly environment
- More meeting space
- Unifying outcome
- Support VUU's mission

Together we are making this vision reality. The early portion of the campaign will continue over the rest of the summer.



The Capital Campaign Committee is thrilled to report that, after an early effort, pledges as of July 21 exceed \$1 million. We are very encouraged by this progress and optimistic about reaching our campaign target of \$2.5 million.

Starting October 1, the Capital Campaign will merge with the Annual Stewardship Campaign to become a Combined Campaign. You will notice a difference this year. Most of our congregants will be contacted to schedule a personal visit during October. Your Steward will spend some time visiting with you and then will ask you to continue (or even increase!) your annual operating pledge. After you have filled out the Operating Campaign pledge card, there will be time to discuss our plans for building a new Sanctuary and improving the existing structure. This will be your opportunity to make a second pledge—a three-year commitment to separately support our Capital Campaign.

How can you help make all this a success?

In the next few months, additional stewards for the Combined Campaign will be recruited and trained. Our current stewards can testify that making stewarding visits is rewarding and even fun! Our VUU professional fundraiser, Chris Sar, will present another set of training sessions on Sept. 8 and 15th, one from 8:30 to 10:15, and one from noon to 1:45, on both days. 
