A MESSAGE FROM THE ACTING BOARD PRESIDENT

JANUARY 2020

Well, here we are at the beginning of a new decade. Can you believe we're already 20 years into the new century? What might the term 2020 mean to us? Of course, there's the new year with all of its resolutions and hope for a better year than 2019. Then, there's the television program that attempts to bring depth and clarity to a current story or issue. And, there's also the eye test, where 2020 means we don't need glasses or contacts. Let's pause to think about crystal clear vision.

From comments swirling around our congregation, I have the distinct suspicion that VUU's two campaigns, operational and capital, have confused quite a few people. So, let me try to focus our collective vision a bit. The capital campaign was undertaken to acquire the money needed to create oUUr faith oasis for the future. You were asked to think about this then promise to donate, over three years, money toward that future.

At almost the same time the capital campaign for our future began, our annual pledge drive, which we called the operational campaign, began. So, where's the confusion? Some people who pledged to donate to the capital campaign think that the one promise covered both the creation of our future faith oasis and the annual operational expenses. But, it did not.

As you know, our faith community has expenses like any family does – mortgage, utilities, yard upkeep, and salaries. But, in addition, we have expenses for the programs we create and offer – all levels of education, expenses for sound and visual equipment for services, the cost of music for our incredible singers and musicians, etc. Like many families, our operational budget is much like yours. We periodically figure out about how much money we expect during the year, and then, we decide where and how to spend that money. And, like you, if the monies pledged for next year do not at least meet the monies pledged for this year, we must take a very serious look at where to put the money we do get. This might involve trimming programs, or even cutting some.

There are fearless people in our UU community who have volunteered to contact those from whom we have no record of an operational pledge. They use snail mail, email, texts, phone calls, and Sunday morning conversations to persuade these non-pledgers to complete the pledge cards — even if the pledge is for zero or even \$5 (for the year). The return of these pledge cards lets our VUU budgeteers know that everyone has been contacted and they have *X* amount of money to allocate for 2020. Your pledge gives them clear vision. So, if you have not yet returned your pledge card, please take a few minutes during this busy holiday season to think about all that VUU offers our community, and with that clear vision, pledge whatever amount your own family's budget can afford.

P.S. You can pledge online at vuu.org (click on the **GIVE** tab in the blue bar at the top of the web page), or grab a pledge card at the back of the sanctuary, complete it, and put it in either the offering plate or the gold and silver box near the palm trees at the back of the sanctuary. And, from our entire VUU family, thanks for your generosity!

OUR WHOLE LIVES for "Barn Owls" K-gr.1 Children & Parents' Combo Class

OUR WHOLE LIVES (OWL) is an age-appropriate, yet comprehensive sexuality education program developed by Unitarian Universalists. It engages children in activities that help them to clarify their values and teaches communication and decision-making skills. It encourages children to value themselves and to act on their values throughout their lives.

This class will address topics, such as anatomy, family structures, how babies are made and safe touch.

Parents are in the class with their child as active participants. The goal is to open communication within the family, because parents are a child's primary sexuality educator.


