“A Moment with the Minister”

There’s an old wisdom story in the Hebrew Bible, probably a re-telling of an ancient Eastern folktale, that for a long time served as the gold standard for wisdom fables. It involves King Solomon, by some accounts the wisest-ever king of Israel. And although it is valuable historically, I believe it demonstrates one of the unhealthiest models of our June theme, wisdom.

In the setup of the story, God came to the young King Solomon in a dream and offered to grant him one wish. Whatever he wanted. I might have started Googling motorcycles, but not Solomon. He said, “Your servant is in the midst of a great people, too many to count. And I am their king. So give me an understanding mind to govern them, able to discern between good and evil, for who can govern this great people?” One wish and he asked for wisdom! One wonders if he might be available to run for elected office.

The next day, as if to test his newly-granted smarts, two women came to the king with a dispute. They lived in the same house, and both had recently given birth on the same day. Something terrible had happened. While the two women slept in their separate bedrooms, one of them rolled over onto her baby in the middle of the night and killed the child. Upon waking up and realizing what she had done, she crept into the other’s bedroom, stole the living baby from its mother’s bed, and replaced it with the baby now deceased. The woman who was accused of stealing the living baby denied the charges. The king was asked to settle the dispute.

After listening to the mothers argue for a while, Solomon called for a sword to be carried to him. He said, according to the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible, “Divide the living boy in two, then give half to the one, and half to the other.” Just chop him in half, each mother gets one end, and everybody goes home... happy? One of the women said, “Sounds good.” But quickly, the true mother called out, “Don’t kill him! Give him to the other woman!” And Solomon knew then that she was the real mother of the living child. And, according to the Bible, “All Israel heard of the judgment that the king had rendered; and they stood in awe of the king, because they perceived that the wisdom of God was in him, to execute justice.”

I don’t know about you, but this story has always horrified me. The poor mother! But this model of wisdom has dominated for a long time. There’s one person at the top of the heap whom we all beg for answers to our problems. Even Western democracies like ours are polluted by this idea. And of course, many people think about God this way.

But I don’t think that’s how wisdom works. I think we are obligated to run these ancient wisdom stories (several of which we will hear in worship services this month) through the filters of human reason and community. In fact, I’d say that’s true of everything, including books and speeches and even this little newsletter column. Seems to me wisdom more often rises up out of community than being handed down from on high.

I suppose I wonder how things might have been different if these women could have called together a group of their peers to help them sort through the issue. Surely the threat to kill the baby could have been avoided. Maybe they would have widened the scope of the problem to include how to prevent infant deaths. Who knows? Solomon’s approach shut down the opportunity for greater wisdom to emerge.

I know it’s just a fable, and that it never happened historically. Actually, that’s precisely why I feel free to apply it to our own situation. We live in perilous times. In days like these, we need to avoid looking for a savior, one elected leader or divine being who will change everything. Rather, let us remember that we are wise and strong and powerful, that gathered as community in all our diversity we have all the wisdom we need to solve the problems we face.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

Dear friends of VUU,

Thanks to everyone that was able to attend the Congregational Conversation last weekend. We had over 100 folks in attendance and a good conversation about our current state and our next steps for growth. As mentioned in that meeting, our financial condition continues to be on target with our current projections which includes significant surplus. Also mentioned in the meeting, the surplus is due in part to pledges paid early and in part due to expense savings. Part of the surplus will be carried as income to the new fiscal year, with the remainder applied to our cash reserves. We will ask for the congregations vote at the year-end meeting to approve the budget that was presented at the conversation last week. Members received a copy of the budget through email.

We also reviewed a Special Funds committee charter update that will simplify the process of available funds for grant each year. The fund is doing very well and if it continues to grow, this means that there will be more available for the congregational needs into the future. This charter change will also require a congregational vote during the year-end meeting. The full charter with changes will be sent to members via email this week. (*Special Funds Charter update attached to this same email.*)

We wrapped up the meeting with a discussion on our growth plans. We reviewed what we have accomplished so far with our planning including current property valuations, reviewing available new sites, and improving/expanding our current campus. The architects are putting their final touches on a presentation for the congregation that we will review at the year-end meeting. We will ask the congregation to vote on moving forward with a capital campaign to start us on the next steps of feasibility and further planning for the project. This vote will only approve moving forward with a capital campaign and not a specific building plan. We will continue to refine the plans and options as we go through the process of the capital campaign including continued input and guidance from the congregation.

To help with understanding all these votes, the board put together the following motions that we will propose at the year-end meeting:

- On behalf of the VUU Board of Trustees, I move that the budget as presented at the Annual Meeting of the Valley Unitarian Universalist Congregation be passed by the congregation for the fiscal year 2018-19, and that the budget include carryover income of up but not exceeding \$28,400 of the current fiscal year surplus, and that any remaining surplus is retained as cash reserves.
- On behalf of the VUU Board of Trustees, I move that the Valley Unitarian Universalist Congregation adopt the changes to the Special Funds Charter as proposed at the Congregational Conversation.
- On behalf of the VUU Board of Trustees, I move that the Valley Unitarian Universalist Congregation initiate a campaign for the purposes of raising capital for future physical campus improvements, and that a capital improvements committee (planning) and a capital campaign committee (fundraising) shall be formed from the membership of the congregation, who shall report to the Board no less frequently than quarterly.

There will be time for discussion on these motions. I'm hopeful that seeing these in advance will help provide some clarity before the meeting, so we don't run too long. The Leadership Development Committee will also hold elections during this meeting.

It has been a great year and a wonderful experience for me on the board this year. It is so nice to be in such a positive financial condition which has allowed us to think bigger and do more in our community. The future is looking bright and exciting.

I hope to see you at the year-end meeting June 3rd at 12:00.

Summer curriculum June 3rd – August 26th

Infants – 4-year olds: Open play with our childcare staff. Childcare is available every Sunday 8:30 am – 12:30 p.m., **room 6 in the Education complex.**

Children entering kindergarten – 5th grade: Start in the sanctuary with families. Children will self-select Books & Cooks group or Make/Do group. Wrist bands will help teachers identify which group children have selected. **Class will meet in rooms 1 & 2 in the education complex.**

The Dalai Lama and Friends Workshop





They will be on break until Tuesday, October 2, when they will rehearse from 6:15 p.m. to 7 p.m. in the sanctuary kitchen. This fun group is for children mostly K through 6th grade, and they perform for worship services about once a month.

Voices Lifted Singers: Rehearsals will resume on Sunday September 2 at 1:30 p.m. This ensemble of female voices sings in community settings such as assisted living homes, senior centers, and at bedside for those recovering from surgery or illness or are receiving hospice care.

CABARET: This fun annual social & musical event is basically a variety show put on by the Adult Choir and other VUU members. Please mark your calendar now for Saturday September 29 at 7 p.m. The theme is yet-to-be-decided.

Denominational Connections Update

During the last week of April UUs from around the West gathered in Portland OR for the second ever regional assembly. 650 people from 130 congregations were in attendance. There are about 180 congregations in the Pacific Western Region (PWR).

There were inspiring addresses from Rev. Susan Fredrick Gray (UUA President) and Congresswoman Pramila Jayapal. Video of these addresses and the open Sunday morning worship service can be found at <https://www.uua.org/pacific-western/regional-assembly>.

On Saturday afternoon all the districts held their business meetings. For the Pacific Southwest District (PSWD) this was a combined business meeting of the district and Camp de Benneville Pines. The delegates approved PSWD bylaw changes that removed gender binary and ablest language from the PSWD bylaws. A budget was passed that funded the district at current levels for the next fiscal year. This is a deficit budget of about \$6K. This can be funded out of district reserves, which are ample to cover deficits at this level for many years. The primary reason for the deficit was underpayment of fair share dues by a number of congregations in the district.

During the Camp portion of this meeting the delegates approved extensive bylaws revisions that removed references to the PSWD, in case the district dissolves in coming years. The camp budget for the next year was also passed. It should be noted that the Camp Ministries Director (CMD) will no longer be an employee of the district or the UUA, that person will be a direct employee of Camp de Benneville Pines. Support for this position will continue from the PSWD budget for the next 3 years, diminishing by 1/3 every year. Improvements to camp were presented, including a new water tank.

And do not forget about General Assembly (GA) that will be held the 3rd week of June. Information on this event has been in our newsletter and in many of the weekly blasts. Folks can register as an online delegate, or can look at business meetings online, check it out at uua.org.

Good morning everyone. It's hard to believe I'm been a member of this community now for 12 years. What I've learned are the difficult, yet valuable lessons about what it means to be human. Difficult because our principles are not always easy to live; valuable because when practiced, our principles give us peace of mind and meaning in life.

I try to live these principles daily. I have them posted in my bathroom, so I read them every, single, day. The way I see it, we can live these principles two ways: through our community, or in other aspects of our daily lives. I have found a way to combine them.

I've served this community through various fundraisers, the RE/OWL program, Chalice Circles, and finally, my tenure as a worship associate. In my life outside this community, I try to live these principles, acting as a model for them, and I just happen to have a captive audience: high school students.

No, I don't preach in the classroom (in a manner of speaking). The one volunteer effort that has rendered the most meaning for me has been my work at *Paz de Cristo* the past ten years—I have averaged 10 out of 12 commitments a year. About eight years ago it occurred to me that I could, in a very real way, bring this experience to my students. So, I began to ask them to volunteer with me, and for the past eight years, approximately 150 students have given their time to this worthwhile charity.

Now, I'm retiring and moving to Denver, but I consider this "teaching moment" to be among my finest. My kids think so, too. If you are in a position to "recruit" young people, to provide for them the real experience of altruism, to show them first hand that the real meaning of love is an extended hand—then do it. I ask you here today, to take my place, live our principles, and make others' lives a little brighter and meaningful.
