"A Moment with the Minister"

I have worked hard to develop a personal theology of gratitude that can fly above the varying fortunes of my everyday life. If you want easy work, look someplace else. Still, this cultivation of gratitude is for me an important spiritual practice. Remembering to be grateful makes me feel more connected to everything around me and, ultimately, it makes me really happy. Why would I only want that when things are looking good?

One shining light on this gratitude path is the Vietnamese Buddhist monk Thich Nhat Hanh. The next few paragraphs are from a chapter of the book "Thich Nhat Hanh: Essential Writings." It's entitled "Roses and Garbage."

"Defiled or immaculate. Dirty or pure. These are concepts we form in our mind. A beautiful rose we have just cut and placed in our vase is immaculate. It smells so good, so pure, so fresh. It supports the idea of immaculateness. The opposite is a garbage can. It smells horrible, and it is filled with rotten things.

"But that is only when you look at the surface. If you look more deeply you will see that in just five or six days, the rose will become part of the garbage. You do not need to wait five days to see it. If you just look at the rose, and you look deeply, you can see it now. And if you look into the garbage can, you see that in a few months its contents can be transformed into lovely vegetables, and even a rose.

"If you are a good organic gardener and have the eyes of a bodhisattva, looking at a rose you can see the garbage, and looking at the garbage you can see a rose. Roses and garbage inter-are. Without a rose, we cannot have garbage; and without garbage, we cannot have a rose. They need each other very much. The rose and garbage are equal. The garbage is just as precious as the rose. If we look deeply at the concepts of defilement and immaculateness, we return to the notion of inter-being."

Some of the worst experiences of my life have led to some of my deepest self-understanding. I do not offer thanks for the experiences themselves, but I do see the germination of a rose in the garbage of very bad days. Every now and then I can even see it in the middle of the very bad experience. "Oh, this is going to make me stronger," I think. And it usually does.

Life isn't easy for any of us, and that makes gratitude a challenge sometimes. But for those with eyes to see, there are roses in the garbage, and there's garbage in the roses. It's just the way things are. And for that, I am deeply grateful.

In just a few days, **on November 4**, we'll extend Sunday morning even further with our CommUUNITY Sunday, during which we challenge each other to make or raise our financial commitment to our spiritual home for 2019. There'll be a wonderful **catered lunch at 12:30** to celebrate and break bread with our community. There is no charge for lunch, and there will be vegetarian and vegan options. Bring the kids, of course!

What is the board working on right now?

- We're chartering the Capital Campaign and Capital Planning Committees, who have both met and begun their work. We expect they'll soon be communicating with members in various ways, including through the web site, so keep your eyes open, and make sure to feed back to them as they guide VUU in building a new way.
- We all interviewed with the Leadership Development Committee, who are making a short video to highlight what the board does and how we do it. It was a great time for each of us to reflect on and verbalize why we do this important work.
- We spent time brainstorming ideas around how we know we are accomplishing our ends statement #1: "We challenge each person to discover, experience, and be transformed by the deep and mysterious." 

Fourteen activist ministers and lay leaders apply a keen intersectional analysis to the environmental crisis, revealing ways that capitalism, white supremacy, patriarchy, and other systems of oppression intersect with and contribute to ecological devastation. They also explore how spiritual practices, congregational organizing, and progressive theology can inform faith-based justice work in the twenty-first century.

These prophetic voices, from a wide range of perspectives, reveal new approaches and opportunities for more holistic, accountable, and connected justice efforts. Each essay is accompanied by suggested ways to take the next steps for further learning and action.

Preschool: We are Many, We are One; encourages children to use their minds, bodies, and emotions to develop their sense of identity and self-esteem and connect with our Unitarian Universalist Principles.

Kinder/1st grade: Combining 2 curricula from the UUA: *Wonderful Welcome* - intangible gifts central to UUism (friendship, hospitality, and fairness) & *Love Surrounds Us* – explores the UU Principles in the context of Beloved Community of family/home, school, and neighborhood.

2nd/**3**rd **grades:** *Free To Believe*: Activities, games, stories and discussions to explore the 7 Unitarian Universalist Principles and how they lead us to find personal answers to some "big questions" around faith, death, and creation.

4^{th/5th} grades: Harry and UU: A social action curriculum based on J.K. Rowling's Harry Potter books uses discussion and magical activities to engage the children and empower them to become more motivated and passionate about social action. The Endowment Fund is made of generous contributions from VUU members who donate to the fund through annual contributions, as well as estate bequests. And each year for Recognition Sunday we invite additional contributions in honor of one special long-time member and their service to our congregation and community. Read More About Beverly:



Beverly came to VUU in the year 2000 from New York and from a Unity Church. Thinking she had found another Unity Church, Beverly visited the Unitarian Universalist Church of Central Phoenix, loved the message and planned to attend there again. But in researching their address for a second visit she found VUU's address instead and that serendipity brought her here on a Sunday when the choir was singing, and she never searched for another church again.

Growing up, Beverly lived in New York City during the school year and spent her summers with family in Oxford, North Carolina. She attended Bushwick High School in Brooklyn, NY and attended Hunter College in Manhattan, NY, where she majored in history, economics and political science. Beverly's dreams included becoming a singer, dancer, actor and to find a career involved in international relations, but in their place, she found herself in a classroom where she fell in love with the kids and the classroom experience. Her education career included becoming the Assistant Principal at Louis Armstrong Middle School in Queens, and Principal at John J Pershing Intermediate School in Brooklyn, NY, where she won the Carnegie Institute's *Principal of the Year* Award. Included in Beverly's proud education experience was the extraordinary task of overseeing and completing the renovation of the severely dilapidated John J Pershing School, overcoming many criticisms and obstacles placed by a school superintendent, union members and the lack of funding. Nevertheless, she persisted, wrote many grants for needed supplies and got the job done!

Beverly has been very involved here at VUU since her arrival, first joining the choir, then becoming involved in the religious education program as a teacher and working with teenagers in the coming of age program. She has held the positions of vice president and president on the congregational board as well as serving as a volunteer coordinator, as the Cabaret publicist for a few years, organizer of one of the congregational member directories and has led and participated in Chalice Circles. While on the board Beverly introduced policy governance, worked to delegate out board duties to various committees, helped with due diligence required before purchasing VUU's current land and buildings, and served on the ministerial search team for finding our current settled minister, Reverend Andy. Beverly is currently serving on the Leadership Development Committee and is still wholly committed to the choir.

Diversity has been foundational and formational for Beverly. Exposure to many diverse groups of people throughout her life has created for Beverly a wider appreciation of folks who are different from her and has given her an ease of working with varied groups of people. She believes this has also helped her through some very difficult experiences of racism. It is due to these both affirming and painful racial experiences, that Beverly has committed herself to making others aware that it is fear that separates us and keeps racism alive. Inspired by a General Assembly session, and in conjunction with Rev. Andy, Beverly brought the *Beloved Conversations* and *Difficult Conversations* (Listening with Care) courses to the VUU Congregation and co-facilitated these sessions with Barbara Quijada. She has also brought to VUU the awareness of the *Black Lives Matter* campaign and has facilitated book talks and movie outings

with conversations afterwards focusing on racism awareness. Look for more movie outings and book talks with Beverly in the future.

For fulfillment, Beverly practices yoga and is a committed Buddhist embracing the foundational principle of mindfulness. For fun, she joins in the VUU Singles Group activities, participates in the monthly VUU Social (Circle) Suppers and insists she has the most fun on Sunday mornings mingling with congregation members before and after service.

Thank you, Beverly, for your smiling face, your exemplary example and your service to VUU and our community. We are honored to recognize you on this 2018 Recognition Sunday for all of the ways you contribute to, serve and bless our community!

The story below was written by a VUU member, Amanda Schneider, who responded to the call for volunteers to help with refugees who had been taken by ICE to local churches.

Today I saved a star fish.

*Names have been changed

7:00 am - I met Rob at the bus station, after dropping off Miguel for his bus trip to Virginia. Rob had been there since 5 am the previous day, helping asylum-seeking immigrants navigate the bus system and handing out snacks so they could eat something while they waited for their upcoming trips across the country. (Most without money to buy food for themselves.)

7:15 am - Rob told me about Jasmine who needed to get to a Western Union to pick up money from her brother. She was traveling to Boston (where her brother was) tomorrow. Her brother knew it would be a long trip and wanted her to have money so she could buy food and a phone, so he could stay in contact with her. I offered to help.

7:30 am - I took Jasmine to a QT close by to get the money, only to discover that location only made out checks, did not cash them.

7:35 am - Drove to the airport, the closest money-receiving Western Union I could find. Thankfully a good friend of mine answered her phone and was able to translate to Jasmine where I was taking her, as I speak zero Spanish and she speaks zero English.

8:00 am - Learn that the state of AZ requires an actual driver's license or passport to use as identification - the paper copy of Jasmine's ID is not sufficient.

She cannot receive the money her brother sent to her.

8:05 am - Call friend back to translate and arrange to have brother send money to me in my name. (Brother does not speak English either.)

8:30 am - Take Jasmine back to bus station with the promise I will pick up the money and bring it back to her. Rob has arranged for Jasmine to go back to a local church to spend the night rather than staying at the bus station. I drive them both to the church. I find out that Jasmine's brother would also like Jasmine to have a pre-paid phone, so she can keep in contact with him during her journey. (She had to use my phone to call him earlier at the bus station.) I agree to pick up the money, buy a pre-paid phone and bring it back to Jasmine.

9:00 am Drop off Jasmine. Then drop off Rob at a nearby bus stop. (He refuses to let me take him to his destination. I don't know if he even has a permanent address.)

11:15 am Receive phone call from Brother John, who is the step-father of Jasmine's brother. (And her too? Don't know.) He translates and tells me the money order is in my name.

2:00 pm Pick up money and go the Walmart to get the pre-paid phone. Purchased some essentials for her out of our pocket so she will have some comfort on her journey and a wallet to hold her money.

2:15 pm Pick up Zach from a friend's house and drive downtown to deliver money and phone. I also give the Pastor of the church \$100 of the brother's money at his request as a blessing for taking care of his sister. Zach has a migraine and it is all I can do to drop off the supplies, the money and the phone. I ask if someone can help Jasmine activate the phone. The volunteers at the church are slammed but say they will. I say goodbye to Jasmine and am able to give her a hug. (Which feels so good.)

3:00 pm Call Brother John to tell him I have delivered the money and phone. He asks for the number so her brother can call her. I explain I was unable to activate it, but someone was going to help her.

5:00 pm Her brother texts me to ask if I was able to buy his sister a phone. He confirms he has not heard from her and he does not have a number to call her.

5:30 pm I call the pastor of the church and ask if they are able to help Jasmine figure out how to activate the phone. He said his wife will go and help her now. He tells me the \$100 her brother gave them made it possible for them to feed all the immigrant's dinner that night.

7:00 pm I text her brother to see if he has heard from her yet. (From Aaron's soccer game in north Phoenix.) He replies that he has not and knows nothing.

7:20 pm I promise I will go back to the church on my way home to help her activate it. I text the Pastor to let him know I am coming. He is immensely grateful - said they received another bus load of families with babies and were busy helping them.

7:50 pm Aaron and I drive back to the church...only to find out Jasmine has been taken to another Pastor's home for the night. At this point, I am losing hope of getting her connected with her brother. But the incredible volunteers look in their notebooks and find where she is. They call and ask the Pastor to call me...who does immediately. I am able to explain that she has a phone that needs to be activated so she can call her brother. He says he will call me back when it is done.

8:30 pm Aaron and I head home.

8:35 pm I received this text from her brother: "Thank you very much for your help and I spoke with her, may God bless you all for every good thing you do to people who need help."

I burst into tears of relief. My work was finally done.

I don't say all of this to brag in any way about what I did today. I share this to show how extremely difficult it was to get one asylum-seeker some money from her family and a way to communicate with them as she travels across the entire country, alone, not knowing the language. What would have happened to her had I not been there? Rob had no vehicle to take her anywhere and there are just too many for the churches to handle the extra work this required.

I think about all of the families sent off on buses across the country...without money or food...to hopefully end up where they need to be. To have no access to communication with their family. To have no language to use to advocate for themselves. How utterly terrifying that would be.

I am so incredibly grateful for the network of humanitarians coming together to work endless hours to care for these fellow humans. The sacrifices I saw in just this brief period today were incredibly inspiring and humbling. These people working hard...to feed and house them...to make their journey a little lighter...a little less scary...a little more humane.



A saved one star fish today. There are literally hundreds of them...stuck on the shore without an advocate...how could my work possibly make a difference?

Well...I made a difference for this one, sweet, kind and gentle one...who has gone through who-knows-what to get here from Guatemala...to be reunited with her brother. That is enough for today. \checkmark <3

Update: Amanda found out a week after her meeting that her starfish had made her way safely to her brothers.





Our Best Kept Secret — The VUU Memorial Garden

The garden is supported by user fees and overseen by the Facilities Team. The basic fee is \$150.00. This includes the inhumation and placement of the loved one's name on a wall plaque. If desired an individual bronze plaque can be ordered and placed on a special, blue wall in the garden. There is a separate charge for this. If you wish to place ashes in the garden, please contact the church office or the minister.
