“A Moment with the Minister”

We live in a culture fashioned around transactions. Some are almost involuntary. The stoplight turns green, I honk at the person in front of me who is looking at their phone and not moving, then I go. I give the grocery store clerk just the right amount of money, and I am allowed to take home bags full of food. That one seems like a miracle if I don't think about it very long. My youngest daughter, Josie, and some of her pals decided they would get in on the action and hawk the many errant golf balls that golfers shank onto the lawns in our neighborhood. The girls set up a little table right where the golfers steer their carts across the street to get to the next tee box. A dollar per ball, their sign declared.

Their first customer, who had just paid \$75 to roll a ball into a hole 18 times, told them they were charging too much and talked them into selling him a ball for half of the original price. He only bought one. Some will say this haggling hack taught the kids a lesson that day. I say he's a grump.

Transactional thinking can blind us to the beauties of life. Thankfully, the world is seasoned with grace. We can't go shopping for grace. It finds us and, if we are open to it, it makes tender our transactional hearts. A pink and orange sunset, holiday lights on a saguaro, the face of a dear one emanating love... grace.

It would be absurd to stand atop South Mountain and offer a hundred bucks for ten more minutes of sunset, or to ask our loved one to look at us 'that way' again. That isn't how grace works. These beauties appear, and are ours for the enjoying, but they exist whether we notice them or not. The trick to experiencing moments of grace is to live with our hearts open, noticing, moving slowly enough that we don't blow right by grace on the way to something less important. Hindu guru Ramakrishna said, "The winds of god's grace are always blowing, it is for us to raise our sails." I figure that's about right.

I'm not much on new year's resolutions. By February, they become nagging houseguests whose welcome is long worn out. But I do think I'll try in 2019 to do a little less and be a little more. I want to raise the sails of my spirit and be guided by the ever-present winds of grace. In the coming year, may grace find you often, and may you be open to its offer of transformation.

**Rev. Andy has lined up some awesome people to preach during January. You won't want to miss a single Sunday!
Here is a preview:**

On January 6, Rev. Dr. Gene Lowry will be joining us. The Rev. Dr. Eugene L. Lowry served as professor of preaching for over 30 years at Saint Paul School of Theology in Kansas City, MO. Now that he is no longer actively serving as the William K. McElvaney Professor of Preaching, his travels as preacher, teacher and pianist have broadened in scope.



Ordained a United Methodist minister, Dr. Lowry's academic preparation includes four degrees, culminating with a doctorate in the philosophy of education from the University of Kansas.

He was Senior Scholar in Residence at Drew University: The Theological School in fall 2003 and fall 2004. In the spring of 1999 he was a guest preacher at Princeton Theological Seminary. Lowry has been featured in the Great Preachers video series on the Odyssey Television Channel. He has been invited to deliver the Lyman Beecher Lectures on Preaching at Yale Divinity School in October of 2009.

Through the years he has preached in hundreds of churches, conferences, and regional events in over 20 denominations as well as lecturing in over 40 graduate theological seminaries across North America.

His writings include six books on narrative preaching and over twenty journal articles and book chapters on preaching, worship, Biblical study, educational philosophy and creativity. His keyboard lecture/concerts relating jazz and Christianity have resulted in four recordings in the blues/jazz mode.

On January 20, MLK Sunday, Rev. Dr. Cari Jackson will be joining us. Rev. Dr. Cari Jackson is RCRC's Executive for Religious Leadership and Advocacy responsible for equipping, galvanizing and collaborating with religious leaders to advocate on behalf of women's moral agency and justice. Dr. Cari came on staff at RCRC after serving as capacity-building consultant. An ordained minister in United Church of Christ (UCC), Dr.

Cari has served as pastor of congregations in UCC, United Methodist Church and Presbyterian Church-USA. She is adjunct faculty at Union Theological Seminary and One Spirit Interfaith Seminary, where she teaches "The Christian Chase for Power" and "Ministry in Multicultural Contexts." As a pastor, she has led numerous community forums, prayer vigils, and marches advocating for a range of social justice issues. Dr. Cari holds a Ph.D. in Christian Social Ethics, Master of Divinity, Juris Doctor, and B.A. in Psychology and Sociology. She is the author five books including *Love Like You've Never Been Hurt* and *For the Souls of Black Folks*.

Message from the President:





HAPPY 2019!!!





Donald Milton III, director of music at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Atlanta, will lead the keynote presentation entitled “Upcycling Church Music for Deeper Engagement.” Together we will explore new ways of approaching hymns, music, readings, rituals and sermons to make them more meaningful, impactful and fully engaging.

Donald Milton III is the director of music at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Atlanta, the largest UU congregation in the Southeast. Milton runs one of the most eclectic and exceptional music programs in the UU movement. He wrote a chapter on upcycling church music for the recently released book, “Upcycle Your Congregation: Creative Ideas for Transforming Faith Communities.”

The district assembly’s theme will be “From the Ground Up: The Power of Our PSWD Communities.”

Special Funds Committee Meeting

12-12-2018 "The Endowment Report"

The Special Funds committee is pleased to report the current combined balance of the endowment funds is \$408,492.

We are equally pleased to report how these funds are being put to use for special projects in our congregation and in our community. To date this year, we've approved two grants for special purposes to advance our congregation's mission:

- A grant of \$1,000 from the Bunny Clarke Leadership fund to pay for our Social Action chair to receive training in community organizing, through our partnership in the Valley Interfaith Project;
- A grant for up to \$10,000 to help defray the costs of the next Coming of Age program trip to Boston. This program is a fantastic opportunity for our high school youth that we offer every other year through our Faith Formation ministry.

Special Funds committee, through the use of endowment funds, is pleased be able to support these outstanding special programs to grow the impact of our congregation and our UU faith in the community and the broader world. Thanks to everyone who supports the endowment fund with contributions annually, or through bequests in your will or estate.



OBITUARY FOR REV. DR. RAYMOND GEORGE MANKER

Rev. Ray was one of the founders of VUU



Rev. Dr. Raymond George Manker (Sr.) died peacefully December 16, 2018, in Phoenix, AZ, at the age of 93. He was born on April 6, 1925, in Santa Monica, CA. His father was Rev. Charles C. G. Manker who became minister of the Unitarian congregation in El Paso, TX, and his mother was Annie Marie Fehn. Raymond received his B.A. from Texas College of Mines & Metallurgy in 1945. He then studied for the Quaker ministry at the College of the Bible at Transylvania University in Lexington, KY, receiving a B.D. in 1948, and then was ordained and entered the Unitarian ministry. He received an honorary Doctorate of Sacred Theology (STD) from Starr King School of the Ministry in 1974.

He married Gretchen Brammer Loomis of Houston TX in 1949. His ministries were in Toledo OH (1949-50), Wayland MA (1950-1955), Riverside CA (1955-1963), and Phoenix AZ (1963-1990). He also served as Executive of the Pacific Southwest District of the Unitarian Universalist Association (1958-1963), during which time he was the founder of deBenneville Pines Conference Center in CA. Later in the 1970s, he also founded SAWUURA (Sierra Ancha Wilderness UU Religious Association), a wilderness retreat in AZ. In his long ministry, he defended targets of McCarthy era hysteria, counseled and advocated for youth, was very active in the civil rights movement including marching with MLK in Alabama and visiting with voting rights workers in Mississippi, advocated for peace and nonviolence, promoted feminism and attended international women's conferences, and promoted LGBT rights (including as an early officiant of same-sex weddings), was active in the sanctuary movement of the 1980s, and committed civil disobedience with Gretchen at the nuclear testing site in Nevada. He was a draft and abortion counselor, supported the United Farmworkers union and the ACLU, served on the Board of the UU Service Committee, was active in IARF, and much more. He was a humanist, a christian, and also attuned to nature spirituality.

He traveled the world extensively with Gretchen and family. Upon his retirement from active ministry in 1990, he was made Minister Emeritus of the UU Congregation of Phoenix AZ. He is preceded in death by his parents, brother Charles Manker Jr, sister Pauline Gay, and son Wendell. He is survived by his wife Gretchen, his children and their spouses Katherine (Bruce Gardner), Raymond Jr (Patti Atchley), Susan (Curtiss Seale), and David (Larry Purifory). He is also survived by four grandchildren Tiffany Brock, Nicholas Manker, Benjamin Manker-Seale, and Kat Choyguha, and three great-grandchildren, as well as nieces and nephews and cousins.

A Memorial Celebration of Life will be held on Saturday, January 26, 2019, at 2:00 pm, at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Phoenix, 4027 East Lincoln Drive, Paradise Valley. Memorial donations may be made to the UU Congregation of Phoenix, or to the American Civil Liberties Union.

As we approach the end of 2018, we wanted to say thank you the 100+ VUUs (and friends) who dedicated so many of their Fridays to the Paz de Cristo effort! Additionally, special thanks to those who helped during the lean and hot summer months! Please read below to learn about of the origins of Paz. It's amazing how a dream and a little yellow house has bettered the lives of countless homeless and struggling families.

Paz's Roots

St. Timothy's newly hired social concerns director was tasked to coordinate various outreach projects the parish was involved in. Their goals were to Feed the Hungry, Give Drink to the Thirsty, Clothe the Naked, and Shelter the Homeless. The vision included a valley wide interfaith component to develop a central place of service both for those with needs AND for those with the need to serve.

Where it Began:

The little yellow, rented house at 559 S Country Club Dr opened July 1988 in Mesa. The first meal was served on September 15, 1988. Meals were prepared at the house, then transported - tables and all, to the parking lot of what was then the Tri-City Community Service Center building at Hibbert and Main Street. Some meals were also taken to the once LEGAL migrant workers in nearby citrus groves.

How it Grew:


Paz quickly outgrew its home on Country Club, and in 1993 a building site was secured. The land was purchased from the Railroad and the shells of the buildings were donated – a donation secured by former AZ Gov. Rose Mofford. Paz was the first organization needing to secure a special use permit for social service agencies in Mesa. The ground breaking of Paz's current location was on Oct. 2, 1993.

There's much more to the history of Paz, but clearly, it's **the hands of many** that makes this dream possible each and every night. So once again, thank you for your service! 
