MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I sent a letter to our representatives via the congregation's [Citizens' Climate Lobby](#) group. I remember as a young adult when the Seventh Principle was added to the UUA (then, six) principles; it was a big deal. *Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.* Indeed, the earth, its living things, the environment, and each other, are a big deal, and UU's around the world have played our part in fighting against their destruction. CCL activities embody our passion for democracy and the environment, together, and I'm proud to see our community so involved in this.

This month the board is looking forward to Reverend Andy's return, and our **February 10 mid-year congregational meeting (at 12:30 p.m.)**. While we will not be taking any formal actions, we hope you will join us for an update on our finances, the 2019 Operating Pledge Drive, and presentations from the Capital Campaign and Capital Planning Committees, who have been working hard toward our long-term campus vision goals.

If you haven't made your pledge for 2019 yet, you still have time to help make our message sweeter by making [your intentions known here](#). We have accounted for 195 households, including 22 first-time pledgers, with over \$400,000 in pledges. Thank you! We need to hear from another 72 households before we can call it a wrap (and we need another \$50,000 to get to a solid budget). Whether \$2 or \$200 a week, **your commitment** makes more difference when we can count on it (in the budget) than when it is given without (in the plate).

Next month, the board returns with Andy to our big project, doing the "math of mission," which includes measuring - in ways we have difficulty defining, but are working on diligently - whether and how in fact we are living up to our [vision and ends statements](#). I use that link often, because we cannot remind ourselves too often why we are here, in this, together. We hope to report to you in June how we are doing. If you have a story, or question, or other input about how we are meeting our own expectations, [please share them with me](#).

We will meet weekly (dates and times to be determined by the group.)



Impoverished communities have relatively little political clout and, therefore, policy decisions have led to poor and non-white communities becoming “the destination for the waste and pollution of more affluent, typically white, communities.” Due to locating power plants, waste facilities, and pollution-generating industries in minority and lower-income settings, “illnesses related to pollutants, troubles with water quality, and a rise in cancer and childhood asthma rates” in these areas have become the national norm. “The environmental movement launched in 1970 lacked the consciousness and commitment to address the structured racial and economic inequality.” The essays in this book attempt to rectify that and integrate these justice issues.






An Interfaith Story of Courage and Compassion With Speaker and Author Marty Brounstein

The Endowment Report – February 2019

The combined balance of the endowment funds is \$404,862.

Despite the volatile swings in the U.S. stock markets recently, our investment mix has weathered the storm well. We are pleased that through the worst of the recent Presidential tantrums and tariffs, shutdowns and showdowns, our endowment lost only 1% of its total value during this period. Our advice continues to be, as always, remain calm and stick to our tested investment strategies and principles.

We have finally wrapped up the final accounting on your donations to the endowment from Recognition Sunday and other 2018 year-end giving. Thanks to tremendous outpouring of love and appreciation for the many years of service of Beverly McCormick, the endowment fund received \$5,095 from over 65 families who made gifts in her honor. In addition, another generous \$1,000 donation was made to the endowment in honor and memory of Betty Sadowsky. These contributions are one way in which the endowment grows each year. But individual commitments by members in their wills and estate plans are also key.



WORKSHOP HIGHLIGHT:

Is Sunday School Really Dead? Find Out at the PSW District Assembly

No, it isn't. But our congregations are part of a huge cultural shift, where 20th century models of children's religious education just aren't working like they used to. However, there are exciting new alternatives rising in Sunday School's place. Join our region's Lifespan Faith Formation specialist at the Pacific Southwest [District Assembly](#) to discuss and explore the issues.



Rev. Sarah Gibb Millspaugh of the UUA regional staff will talk about many of them during the workshop she leads at the [District Assembly](#) April 26-28 at the UU Church of Long Beach.

Rev. Millspaugh answered a few questions recently about her workshop entitled, "The Death of Sunday School and the Birth of What?"

What do you mean by "the death of Sunday school"? What's dying?

Rev. Millspaugh: UU religious educator Kim Sweeney coined the term "The Death of Sunday School" in her [provocative 2017 paper on the future of faith formation](#). Our U.S. culture, our congregations and our families are changing in ways that make the "default" of age-segregated classroom-based Sunday morning religious education not work so well anymore. Acknowledging this helps us begin to think creatively about how we minister meaningfully to children and families, today and in the decades to come.

What will replace it?

Rev. Millspaugh: A variety of models are bubbling up as our congregations grapple with how to best help form the faith of children and families. These include whole-congregation (all ages) worship, multigenerational community service, worship and programs specifically for families with young children, opportunities for age-based programs, and more. And many familiar ingredients of Sunday School will still be a part of what we do: curricula, stories, learning through play, building friendships with peers, Our Whole Lives, Coming of Age, youth groups, and more.

What will attendees who attend your workshop at the District Assembly learn?

Rev. Millspaugh: They'll learn that if they're struggling to maintain an age-segregated, classroom-based program that just doesn't seem to be as robust as it used to be, they're not alone. They'll gain some permission and some ideas to think differently about how we approach religious education as congregations. They'll leave with tools: a framework for engaging in visioning as a congregation around children's programs, and examples of models that other congregations have implemented.

Resolution Copper – The proposed Mega-Copper Mine at the Oak Flat Campground area, near Superior Arizona: What effects would this mine have on Arizona?

Presenter: Roger Featherstone, Director, Arizona Mining Reform Coalition

The proposed mine would produce one billion pounds of copper per year. The deposit will be removed from a depth of more than 7000 feet. This massive operation will produce a tailings (waste) pile covering 7 square miles and with a height of several hundred feet. The waste is expected weather and become acidic, with periodic streams of

wastewater escaping to the environment.
