“A Moment with the Minister”



Forgiveness, this month's congregational theme, is a difficult topic. It's so complex that ancient Taoist masters and leaders in other religions used parables and stories to address the topic, since they draw in both the heart and the head. This month, I offer you one of those ancient Taoist stories, The Sack of Potatoes, as translated on the Prana World website at <http://pranaworld.net/the-tao-of-forgiveness/>.

One day, a sage gave his disciple an empty sack and a basket of potatoes and asked the disciple to write the name of people with whom he still feels angry.

“Think of all the people who have done or said something against you in the recent past, especially those you cannot forgive. Take one potato as a representation of each one of them and put it in the sack.”

The disciple came up with a few names, and soon after his sack was heavy with potatoes.

“Carry the sack with you wherever you go for seven days,” said the sage. “Then we shall meet again.”

At first, the disciple thought nothing of it and carrying the sack was not particularly difficult. After some time however, it became more of a burden. It sometimes even got in his way, and it seemed to require more effort to carry as time went on; even though its weight remained the same.

After a few days, the sack began to smell; the carved potatoes gave off a ripe odor. Not only were they increasingly inconvenient to carry around, they were also becoming rather unpleasant.

Finally, the week was over, and the disciple went to the sage. “Any thoughts about all this?” the sage asked.

“Yes, Master;” the disciple replied. “When we are unable to forgive others, we carry negative feelings with us everywhere, much like these potatoes. That negativity becomes a burden to us and, after a while, it festers.”

“Yes, that is exactly what happens when one holds a grudge. So, how can we lighten the load?”

“We must strive to forgive.”

“Forgiving someone is the equivalent of removing the corresponding potato from the sack. How many of your transgressors are you able to forgive?”

“I’ve thought about it quite a bit, Master,” the disciple said. “It required much effort, but I have decided to forgive all of them.”

“Very well, we can remove all the potatoes. Were there any more people who transgressed against you this last week?”

The disciple thought for a while and realized there were. Then he panicked when he knew his empty sack was about to get filled up again.

“Master,” he asked, “if we continue like this, wouldn’t there always be potatoes in the sack week after week?”

“Yes, as long as people speak or act against you in some way, you will always have potatoes.”

“But Master, we can never control what others do. So what good is the Tao in this case?”

“We’re not at the realm of the Tao yet. Everything we have talked about so far is the conventional approach to forgiveness. It is the same thing that many philosophies and most religions preach – we must constantly strive to forgive, for it is an important virtue. This is not the Tao because there is no striving in the Tao.”

“Then what is the Tao, Master?”

“You can figure it out. If the potatoes are unpleasant feelings, then what is the sack?”

“The sack is the case that allows me to hold on to the negativity. It is something within us that makes us dwell on feeling offended.... Ah, it is my inflated sense of self-importance.”

“And what will happen if you let go of it?”

“Then... the things that people do or say against me no longer seem like such a major issue.”

“In that case, you won’t have any names to inscribe on potatoes. That means no more weight to carry around, and no more bad smells. The Tao of forgiveness is the conscious decision not just to remove some potatoes... but to relinquish the entire sack.”

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

IN SPRING....

While the rest of the Valley's thoughts turn to those of baseball's spring training in February, the thoughts of the VUU Board of Trustees, the Finance Committee, and many others turn to budgets. As Anne Schneider so beautifully presented at the February 9 special meeting, two budgets are compiled. The base budget is basically last year's budget with no changes. Budget A contains any changes generated by a combination of budget priorities from Rev. Andy, the Board, and all the other programs and committees. At the same time, a tally is made of actual pledges, estimated future pledges for the year, and other possible contributions. And that total is compared to the base budget and Budget A. Right now, both versions of the budget are being compiled and compared to the probable total income of VUU. And, just as you do some adding and subtracting from your personal budget if the income and expenses do not at least meet, so too the income and expenses of VUU are reconciled. And, we are extremely fortunate at VUU to be able to tap into the extraordinary financial talents of the Finance Committee, its chair, David Sheh, the Board's financial analyst DeeAnne McClenahan, and Board liaison to the Finance Committee, Bob Fabre. Stay tuned for further news and updates.

On February 9, a special Congregational Meeting was held. At that meeting, a unanimous vote passed the following changes in VUU's by-laws. The changes are in **red**.

Article VI Board of Trustees Section.VI.02 Term

The maximum number of consecutive full **terms** a person can serve on the Board of Trustees is **three (3)**. After a total of **three (3)** consecutive **full terms** on the Board, there must be an interval of at least **two (2) years** until a member may again serve on the Board of Trustees.

Article X. Committees Section.X.02. Leadership Development Committee

After a total of two (2) consecutive full terms on the Committee, there must be an interval of at least two (2) years until a member may again serve on the Leadership Development Committee.

Special Funds Charter II. Composition.

After a total of three (3) consecutive full terms on the Special Funds Committee, there must be an interval of at least three (3) years until a member may again serve on the Special Funds Committee.

Also, at the February meeting, Linda Horton announced the capital campaign total of \$1.2 million. Barbara Quijada then told the congregation that Wendell Burnett Associates (WBA), architects, wants to continue to work with the congregation on its campus vision. WBA will prepare some options, one using the \$1.2 M, one using about \$1.5M, and one using more than \$1.5M. These options will be presented to the congregation at the meeting on May 17, with a vote to follow at the annual meeting. VUU is also very fortunate that people like Linda Horton and Capital Campaign Committee and both Barbara Quijada and Jim Horton, along with the rest of the Capital Planning Committee have volunteered their time, talent, and influence to transform our campus.






1st Thursday of the month, March 5 this month, in Rooms 1 and 2, from 7:00 until 8:30.



We have NOT given up on VUU's VISION for an improved campus that honors **FAITH FORMATION** (CLASSROOMS on east side of parking lot), **FELLOWSHIP** (a NEW SANCTUARY so that current sanctuary can be repurposed as SOCIAL SPACE), and **INTERFAITH COMMUNITY OUTREACH** (connecting the spaces with an OASIS TOWN SQUARE).

As we reported at the Congregational Conversation on Feb 9, the Capital Planning Committee continues to work with Wendell Burnette Architects to see how VUU's VISION can be accomplished with the **\$1.2 million pledged** during the Capital Campaign—and what we might accomplish for just a little more. WBA plans to present new options to the CPC, the CCC, and the Board on March 23—and then we will report our recommendations to the Congregation. Stay tuned!
